Explore ancient rock carvings and paintings with Native Storyteller Thomas Doty. "In our Indian mythology," says Doty, "the Rock People are the oldest people, and the first storytellers." Doty will talk about the meanings of the symbols and how they are combined to create messages and stories. Since the mid 1980s, Thomas Doty has co-directed the Reading the Rocks Project. He has visited hundreds of sites in the West ... documenting, interpreting and protecting these cultural treasures.
